Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application and Reasoning)

Developing Explain if the sentences use the determiners correctly. Sentences using only articles as determiners.

Expected Explain if the sentences use the determiners correctly. Sentences including possessive and demonstrative determiners.

Greater Depth Explain if the sentences use the determiners correctly. Sentences including possessive, demonstrative, interrogative and quantifying determiners.

2. B and C
3. No. A is incorrect because he has used the incorrect determiner. More suitable determiners could be used, for example: Sarah wore a black top and the/a purple hat. B is correct.

Expected

4. A: the, the B: four. C: the D: their.
5. A and B
6. No. A is incorrect because she has used an incorrect determiner. More suitable determiners could be used, for example: When we were walking along the canal we saw the/a/our caravan. B is correct.

Greater Depth

7. A: those, that B: that, her, her. C: whose D: four, her.
8. A and C
9. No. Both sentences are incorrect. More suitable determiners could be used, for example: This/that group of children were laughing very loudly and were told to be quiet many/several times. It was Trevor's birthday in May but his mum took him to a/the zoo to celebrate in the summer holidays.
