Noun or Verb?

Did you know that the same word can sometimes act as a noun or a verb in a sentence? The word class depends on how the word is used in a sentence.



For example:

The word 'ring' can be used as a common <u>noun</u> in this sentence: Mai used an inflatable **ring** as she wasn't a confident swimmer.

The word 'ring' is used as <u>verb</u> in this sentence: When you hear the bell **ring**, it is playtime.
